Omnes de Saba venient

Jakob Handl (1550-1591)

Also known as Jacobus Gallus (his name literally means 'cockerel'), Handl was a Slovenian composer who worked in Austria and Bohemia. This rhythmic Epiphany motet, scored in five parts, was first published in 1586 and sets the prophecy of Isaiah 60:6: 'All they from Saba shall come, bringing gold and frankincense: and shewing forth praise to the Lord.'

Just another Star

Karl Jenkins (b.1944) & Carol Barratt, arr. Peter Gritton

A catchy Christmas number written in the late 1970s by the Welsh jazz musician Karl Jenkins, perhaps best known as a composer for the popular *The Armed Man: a Mass for Peace* (2000).

Venezuelan trad. arranged Alberto Grau Helen Baker

Videntes stellam

Francis Poulenc (1899–1963)
If you came to our Christmas concert last year, you will have heard Poulenc's setting of *O magnum mysterium*, from his *Quatre motets pour le temps de Noël* of 1952. This is from the same group of pieces. 'When they saw the star the wise men were greatly delighted, and they entered the house and offered to the Lord gold, frankincense, and myrrh.'

Reading Patrick Lunt

Noel Antoine Busnois (c1430 - 1492) Busnois worked at the Burgundian court as a singer and composer, and his surviving music includes both sacred and secular compositions. This short piece is unusual in setting only a single, very Christmassy, word and may perhaps be part of a larger piece. It does however provide considerable scope for interpretation!

Follow that Star Peter Gritton You'll hear a couple of arrangements by Peter Gritton this evening, but this is an original piece by him, both the words and music, envisioning the Three Kings' journey as a jazz stomp!

Carol for All: We Three Kings

Glory to the Christ Child

Alan Bullard (b.1947) Bullard studied with Herbert Howells (more of him later), and spent most of his working life as a teacher in Essex. This is a recent piece, from 2006, but the words come from a manuscript in the British Library written about 1610.

French traditional

Un flambeau, Jeannette, Isabelle! comes from Provence, where torches have always played an important part in Christmas celebrations. It is an old carol, and was first published in 1553.

Reading Ann Crisp

Here is the Little Door

Herbert Howells (1892–1983) Howells wrote this in 1918, entitling it 'A Carol of Gifts'. The words are by Frances Chesterton, the wife of the writer G. K. Chesterton. It's a local piece, too: the Chestertons lived in Beaconsfield and the young Howells wrote it on a visit there.

Los Reyes Siguen la Estrella

Francisco Guerrero (1528 - 1599) Guerrero was born and died in Seville, working mainly in Spain and Portugal. On his only visit to the Holy Land in 1589, he was captured and held to ransom by pirates. This piece is one of his many sacred *villancicos*, setting religious words to catchy popular tunes. In this piece the Kings follow the star, which follows the Lord who seeks out sinners...

A Boy was born

Benjamin Britten (1913–1976) The Three Kings

Peter Cornelius (1824–1874) Britten, like Howells, was only in his twenties when he wrote *A Boy was Born*, a setting of some 16th-century German words, which he dedicated to his father. It was the work which first brought him to the public's attention. Cornelius was a poet as well as a composer, and set his own poem 'Die Könige' ('The Kings'), for solo voice, in 1859. When Franz Liszt saw the piece he suggested using the famous 16th-century chorale 'How brightly shines the morning star' to accompany it.

Santa Claus is coming to town

Fred Coots (1897-1985)

First sung in 1934, this song went on to become one of the biggest sellers in American music history. The arrangement, in six parts, is by Peter Gritton.

DAVID COOKE BA (hons), BMus (hons), ALCM

David studied music at Liverpool and Oxford Universities. He specialised first in the early 16th Century keyboard repertoire, and then in the music of the later Middle Ages, working particularly on problems of its interpretation and performance.

As an instrumentalist, he studied the trombone, piano and harpsichord. He appears as an accompanist, and as a continuo player in baroque music. He has also performed widely as a player of several early wind instruments.

As well as the Damon Singers, David is Musical Director of the Wycombe Philharmonic Choir & Orchestra, the Chess Valley Male Voice Choir, the Chiltern Hundreds Bach Choir and the Chorleywood Chamber Orches*
