JUBILANT SONG

Many Years Sergei Prokofiev (1891–1953) Well known for his ballet, operas, and symphonies, Prokofiev never wrote for the Church. This short acclamation was composed for Eisenstein's 1942 film Alexander Nevsky, a great success with Soviet audiences due to its captivating music.

AT EVENTIDE

The Steady Light

Reginald Unterseher (b.1956)

Unterseher is a contemporary American composer, based in Washington State. He writes of this piece, composed in 2003: 'None of us are who we are without the people who have shown us the way, and we all show the way to those who will follow. We must choose carefully which light to follow, and which we carry. This piece is dedicated to our heroes, those people who made the choice to be the light for us.'

Gentle Light

Aleksandr Kastalsky (1856–1926) Kastalsky was for many years conductor of the Synodal Choir, and after the Revolution taught at the Moscow Conservatoire. His setting of the ancient hymn Phos Hilaron, from the Orthodox All-night Vigil (often translated in English as 'Hail, gladdening light'), was written in 1904.

Holy is the True Light

Sir William H. Harris (1883–1973) Harris was director of music at St George's Chapel, Windsor, from 1933 to 1961, and is well known for his church music, notably the sumptuous double-choir Faire is the heaven. Here he works on a much smaller scale, the result yet still beautifully crafted: a short anthem for saints' days, with words from the Salisbury Diurnal.

Our Father

Aleksandr Grechaninov (1864–1956) A favourite of Nicholas II, Grechaninov wrote much for the Orthodox Church, before finally leaving Russia after the Revolution for France, then America. His setting of the Lord's Prayer dates from 1902.

Hymn to St Cecilia

Benjamin Britten (1913–1976) Composed during 1941-2 this was the last collaboration between Britten and the poet W H Auden. It continues a long line of musical odes to the patron saint of music, whose feast day is shared with Britten's birthday. The piece is in three sections, plus three iterations of a refrain ("Blessed Cecilia, appear in visions to all musicians, appear and inspire") which, slightly varied, follows each section. The first section, musically similar to the refrain, recalls and transmutes aspects of the saint's life while the second, a fleet-footed scherzo, captures the essence of music. The third section is replete with imagery relating to musical instruments, characterised by a series of short solos. The final refrain is a radiant reminiscence of the Hymn's opening music.

Wilberforce Kakoma (1923 - 2012) arr. David Cooke

Kakoma was the composer of Uganda's national anthem. His lullaby is arranged by our conductor with the kind permission of Barbara Kakoma. Its sentiments are familiar to all parents... "Rock baby, go to sleep. Sleep, sleep, sleep, sleep. When sleep comes you will fall asleep. Thank goodness baby is getting drowsy. Thank goodness baby is falling asleep".

IN REMEMBRANCE OF WORLD WAR I

A Memory of Gallipoli A P Herbert Read by Patrick Lunt

For the Fallen *Douglas Guest (1916–1996)* Guest was Organist at Westminster Abbey from 1963 to 1981, during which time he wrote his setting of Laurence Binyon's famous lines. It has since become a standard piece of repertoire for choirs on Remembrance Sunday.

Break of Day in the Trenches

Isaac Rosenberg Read by Ann Crisp

'Plorate filii Israel', from Jephthe

Giacomo Carissimi (1605–1674) Carissimi's oratorio recounts the biblical story of Jephtha who, in return for victory against the Ammonites, pledges to sacrifice to God the first living thing he sees on his return. Nearing home, having defeated the enemy, he is greeted by his own daughter singing in thanksgiving. This final chorus echoes her lament at her imminent and premature death: "Weep, children of Israel, cry all virgins, and raise a sad lament for Jephtha's only child, with a song of sorrow."

Timothy WintersCharles CausleyRead by Malavika Legge

A Jubilant Song René Clausen (b. 1953) Tonight is the first time the Damons have sung anything by Clausen, a professor of music at Concordia College in Minnesota and a popular choral composer. This piece, from which our concert takes its title, sets words from the poem A Song of Joys by Walt Whitman, and was written in 1993.

Birthday Madrigals John Rutter (b.1945) Rutter wrote his five Birthday Madrigals to celebrate the 75th birthday of the great jazz pianist, George Shearing, in 1995. Tonight we perform the last two in the set, **'My true love hath my heart'** and **'When daisies pied'**. The words of the first come from Sir Philip Sidney's great Arcadia (1590); those of the second are from Shakespeare's Love's Labours Lost, with an additional verse from The Old Wives Tale (1595) by George Peele.

Let's do it

Cole Porter (1891–1964) arr. David Blackwell

The amours of impoverished Argentinians and cold Cape Cod clams: a favourite ever since it helped Cole Porter achieve his first Broadway success, Paris, in 1928.

The Keel Row *Trad, arr. John Byrt (b. 1939)* The Keel Row evokes the life and work of the keelmen of Newcastle upon Tyne who worked on large, shallow-draughted boats ferrying coal along the river to waiting collier ships. It was first published in 1770, but may be considerably older. The keelmen lived in the Sandgate area, one of the poorest and most overcrowded parts of the city. John Wesley, after visiting Newcastle, described them as much given to drunkenness and swearing. Most unlike the Damon Singers...
